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

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A car-obsessed dentist who has amassed Britain 's biggest private car collection is selling the whole lot for £100 million.

James Hull, 53, who founded the James Hull Associates chain of dentists, owns more than 450 rare and classic cars, ranging from multimillion pound rare Jaguars to Winston Churchill's Austin, and a Bentley once owned by Elton John.

With no room to park them all near his home in Kensington, west London, he garages them in vast warehouses in Herefordshire, but has now decided to sell up because of health reasons.

Planes (no trains) and automobiles: Dr Hull has collected Bentleys, Rolls Royces and Jaguars, as well as some aircraft from the First and Second World Wars

None of the cars is cheap, but a buyer with particularly deep pockets is needed, because Dr Hull says he is determined to sell the 457-strong collection as a whole.

He is hoping a buyer will come in with a £100 million-plus offer, making it the highest value car sale in Britain .

With cars represented from every decade since the 1930s, the collection includes a Jaguar D-Type, worth in excess of £4 million, a similarly valuable Jaguar C-Type, and Lord Mountbatten's Mini Traveller, as well as a super-rare 1950s Jaguar KXSS.



The collection also includes a Humber which was owned by the judge presiding over the Profumo Affair and a 1961 Jaguar E-Type which belonged to Britain 's world motorcycle champion Mike Hailwood.

Dr Hull, who made his fortune pioneering cosmetic dentistry in the UK, has battled cancer three times in the past four years, earning him the nickname Lazarus to friends. He travelled around the world to track

down some of the rarer models in his collection, shipping them back to Britain and then having them stripped down before rebuilding them.

He said: 'It's the culmination of a life-long hobby. Each car has its own story and all have played a part in the history of British motoring. It's part of our heritage.

'I'm merely a passionate custodian of this hugely significant part of British history and, with luck, I will succeed in finding a home that can not only be enjoyed and treasured by the British public but also be admired by visitors from across the world.'

A number of Dr Hull's cars have appeared at motor shows around the world, competed in the Mille Miglia Italian road-race, and even been used for the Queen's 80th birthday parade.

There are also dozens of cars which have won concours awards, and a collection of British campervans from the 1940s, 50s and 60s, as well as early Land Rovers, classic Range Rovers, and a Sinclair C5 from the 1980s.



The collection, which is being sold privately, has already had a 'huge amount of interest' from private buyers and consortia, from overseas as well as nearer to home, but Dr Hull hopes it will remain in Britain ..

Graham Searle, from the Jaguar Enthusiasts' Club, said: 'Dr Hull is a well known Jaguar Enthusiasts' Club member with an immense passion for Jaguar cars.

Stamp-collecting next? Once he has sold his cars, including this classic Jaguar XK, Dr Hull says he will need a new hobby, but he hasn't picked one yet

'Most of his cars are very original or restored to original specification with great attention to detail, and over the years he must have won more concours awards than any other Jaguar collector.

'He does immense service to the classic car movement in keeping these cars in top condition, and the sale of the collection will attract enormous interest from around the world.

'We of course hope that whoever buys them allows them to be seen and enjoyed by enthusiasts for years to come.'




James Hull made his money after founding James Hull Associates in 1987, becoming the market leader in cosmetic dentistry, specialising in teeth whitening, veneers and implants.

He was devastated in 2006 when vandals broke into one of his warehouses, before hotwiring the Jaguars and crashing dozens of them. Police later said they had 'treated the cars like dodgems'.


Over the past decade, prices for classic cars have shot up, outperforming every other investment and sending the value of the collection soaring.

If he finds a suitable buyer, Dr Hull will need a new hobby, but he's not yet sure what it will be.

He said: 'I'm a collector, so who knows what will turn up next. My wife hopes it will be something smaller like stamps.'

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KNYSNA AND PLETTENBERG BAY FIRE STORM

The dreadful fire storm that engulfed the Knysna and Plettenberg Bay areas over the period June 7 to 10th has left a trail of total devastation . 7 lives have been lost, more than 400 homes raised to the ground ,up to 10,000 left homeless ,possessions, treasured cars , infrastructures destroyed , animals died and forests and vegetation destroyed. It is hard to put into words the extent of the destruction caused by the ravaging fires. 1100 Brave firefighters were involved and an early estimate is that the damage and loss of property will exceed R4 billion!! It is a memory that will not easily be raised from the people of Knysna and Plettenberg Bay. As the reality and the scale of the loss sets in many people will have to deal with the trauma that follows. Knysna area has also now been declared a disaster area.

The Garden Route Motor Club and MG club members have unfortunately also felt the effect of this devastation. 9 members have totally lost their houses and possessions with many more suffering damage and loss . Fortunately no life was lost of our club members. To compound the sadness at least 16 treasured cars have been lost in the fire and these will be extremely hard to replace them. We have also just learnt of the loss of an irreplaceable collection of motorcycles (Vincent's and others) outside of Plettenberg Bay. The fire was so fierce and moving at such pace that the effected members had to flee with only the cloths that they had on. -- very , very sad. The spirit of our club members have been unbelievable and all those members effected have been accommodated. The road ahead is going to be a long one as these members battle how to move forward and to rebuild their lives . Our prayers and thoughts remain with them.

The very blackness of the devastation, the burnt out houses, cars, powerlines hanging on the ground, water spurting out of the odd pipes can truly make you weep, but the magnitude of the generosity of people in the community and throughout SA, the selfless and tireless of others reaching out is just so amazing.

The shared interest of classic cars among car clubs and individuals in SA have rallied around GRMC and the MG club with ongoing messages of support and offering assistance. The messages to those who have suffered the terrible loss of cherished homes, possessions and cars have been so heart-warming. To quote some of these - "We as a club and individuals, wish to convey our very best wishes and words of support to the classic car fraternity in the Garden Route. "We will hold you in our thoughts in the difficult weeks and months ahead as you rebuild your lives " -- " On behalf of our members and friends we wish you all well and strength in rebuilding your lives after the devastating disaster ".The interest and support has been overwhelming. It is just over a month ago that the very successful Knysna motor show was held and most of the cars destroyed were at the motor show. Who would have foreseen this disaster?

We continue to reach out with prayers and support to the greater community as well. Thank you very much for your concerns, prayers, best wishes and support. This is greatly appreciated by the GRMC and MG Club.

SAVVA Technical Tip 121 - Fuel stabilisers

Years back, living in a country that had seriously cold winters one mothballed vehicles that weren't in use. I recall adding an additive of some sort to the fuel tanks of vehicles. Evidently this was to stop the petrol from deteriorating leaving gunk behind and also to stop rust forming in the tank. One had a choice of either empting the tank or filling it to the top with petrol and adding what must have been a stabiliser of some sort. If I remember correctly non ventilated filler caps were also used to stop evaporation.


Fortunately, in those good old days, South Africa had petrol that didn't go "vrot" so quickly and the use of stabilisers wasn't necessary. However in more recent times since the introduction of the "witches brew" we get today it may be necessary as it appears petrol has a limited life.

The use of stabilisers became a topic of conversation recently so I contacted a few suppliers to find that they are now freely available from companies like Motul, Wynn's, Castrol, Briggs & Stratton to name a few. The following is from the brochure of one of the major manufacturers. To Quote:

"In as little as 3 weeks, fresh petrol can start changing its chemistry due to oxidisation, often accelerated by the presence of dissolved metals in the fuel. This process presents itself in the formation of gums and varnishes which clog up the jets in carburettors making starting difficult, as well as peroxides which can eat away metals and rubber.

Incombustible deposits foul up the combustion chambers while the oxidised fuel (often darker in colour) becomes denser making the air to fuel mixture too rich leading to running problems. By using a stabiliser in the fuel when the engine stands over prolonged periods, this prevents oxidisation as well as corrosion allowing better combustion and performance."

Maybe the time has come for us to consider using these products when "mothballing" our cars, lawn mowers, outboard motors etc for winter.

SAVVA Technical Tip 122 - Fuel cut-out solenoids

In response to Technical Tip 118 on the use of fuel cut out solenoids as a security item Ron Gush sent in the following.


Thanks Ron,

To quote:

"Tech Tip 118 is very good but the problem is that, if you are like me, you switch the tap on when you start up and then, when you switch the ignition off, you forget to switch the tap off. So the thief drives away blissfully unaware that there is a clever immobilizer installed.

This wiring diagram, was given to me by my electrical engineer cousin Andrew Gush. After you have switched the ignition on, you press the hidden button. The tap opens and the relay maintains the circuit closed and the tap stays open and off you go. When you switch off, the tap closes automatically. The thief then starts the car, drives until the carburettor is dry and abandons the stalled car so that you can sleep soundly and still find it in the morning.

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SAVVA Technical Tip 123 - Anti-seize compound

Recently, a club member admitted to being a bit impatient and causing a horrible botch-up on his nice shiny sports car. That was to strip the threads in a spark plug hole on an aluminium cylinder head – bless him! The spark plug had decided it was a nice place to be and refused to come out. Instead of being patient and using penetrating fluids or even running the engine to warm the head up he used brute force and ended up with a serious problem on his hands. He now has a choice of either taking the head off for repairs or fitting a Helicoil.

If you haven't, or don't use it, may we suggest you invest in a tube of Anti-Seize compound and coat the treads of plugs when fitting them. It will save a lot of aggravation at a later stage when they have to be removed.



SAVVA Technical Tip 124 - Priming carburettors

Priming carbs after a car has been standing for some time has always been a problem. A solutionoften used to fit an electric fuel pump to prime the system. However, on very early cars this can be difficult especially if they have a six volt system or an early carb with a needle and seat of dubious quality.

A solution has been forwarded by Ian Otridge – it's so simple. To quote Ian:

"I got around the problem of priming the carb on my 1929 Chev by fitting a rubber bulb, the same as fitted to outboard motors. I fitted it between the tank and fuel pump. I now just squeeze it until it gets firm and the car starts at the first turn. It was cheap, simple to install and easy to hide, and works like a dream."

For those of you who haven't owned outboard motors -

You have apetrol tank which stands somewhere in the boat and is connected to the engine with a length of flexible rubber hose. To prime the system there is a "squeezy" rubber bulb in the line. One simply squeezes the bulb whichsucks petrol from the tank andin turn pushes it into the carb. When the carb is full the bulb becomes firm. Basically, it is a rubber bulb with a non-return valve much the same as fitted to a mechanical fuel pump. It does the same job but without having to crank the engine.
